Council Report

Greetings from the council. We hope you are all staying well.

Fall has arrived with its cooler and wetter weather. We are still operating under Phase 2 of the reopening process laid out by the governor and supported by the synod. We are making plans for virtual services and meetings in the foreseeable future. This means that we won't be able to have our traditional Harvest Carnival. However, we are planning to hold a "trunk or treat event" outdoors in the parking lot.

We will be holding a congregational meeting in November 15th @ 11am to vote on the budget and elect new council members. We have determined that we are able to vote electronically, so the meeting will be a virtual meeting. We will provide you with more information on how to participate in this meeting. We will need a quorum of 40 adult members to be able to vote. Please plan to attend

At our October meeting the council approved a budget for 2021 that was developed by the stewardship committee. We attempted to develop a budget that matched our projected income for the year without significantly reducing our staffing and day to day operations. We didn't quite achieve this but we did end up with a budget that is significantly below our 2020 budget. We will be presenting the budget to the congregation for approval at our congregational meeting in November.



We will have five council vacancies to fill for 2021. There will be four 3 year terms due to terms expiring and one 2 year term due to a member moving. If you are interested in being on the council please let Pastor Krista or a council member know. Our agenda for 2021 will be to determine what our mission in the community and the world should be and to begin planning into the future how best to accomplish that mission.

To aid in this process the council has initiated a mission discernment process. As part of this process you should have received a letter from Pastor Krista with a list of 26 Bible passages. The letter requests that you read the passages and pick 5 that you think best relate to our mission. If you have not done so already, please do so and send your top 5 stories to Pastor Krista. We will be using this input toguide us as we assess our spiritual gifts and how we can best use them to plan activities that best carry out our mission. We want to have input from at least forty members.

Our garden is done for this year. Thank you to all of you who helped with the planting, weeding, watering, and harvesting. Because of your work we were

able to donate over 400 pounds of fresh vegetables to the food bank.

The council and staff are still trying to maintain contact with everyone. If you need anything, please contact Pastor Krista, John Grebe or the council executive team of Jack Boller, Rick Rodriguez or Terry Adams. Be safe, stay well, and keep the faith. We are looking forward to when we can be together in person again. We wish blessings on you all.

Celebrating Stewards

"All things are yours ... and you belong to Christ, and Christ belongs to God."

1 Corinthians 3:21-23



Is not our goal, as stewards, to find the life that God wants us to have? In his book, 'Giving to God: The Bible's Good News about Living a Generous Life', Mark Allan Powell, asserts that being a steward "is not just a way of life; it is a good way of life. In fact, ... it is a way to a better life."

This journey begins with recognizing a fundamental truth about life. Think about it. You did not 'make' yourself. You were born, not by your choosing, into your life. Your first vocal protests to being birthed started you on a journey of exploration, struggle, curiosity, triumph, and self-discovery. It is counter intuitive to our modern western culture to accept at a fundamental level that we are not self-made. In short, as Paul said, "You belong to Christ, and Christ belongs to God." It follows that you, your life and possessions are ultimately held in trust from God.

Far from being an imposition or a demand on us, accepting that life belongs to God is a 'way to a better life,' as Mark Allan Powell suggests.

The devotional booklet, A Generous Life begins: You were born to be generous! The journey to discovering your best self begins with this truth:

you are created in the image of a loving and generous God! The very essence of God is love and self-giving. Created in the image of God means that God's generosity DNA is woven into the fabric of human community. Into you! Eugene Peterson in Run with the Horses says it this way: "Giving is what we do best. It is the air into which we were born. It is the action that was designed into us before our birth."

A more civic twist to this is how Scott McKenzie rewrote the opening words of the Declaration of Independence in Generosity Rising.

He writes: "We hold these truths to be self-evident that all people are created in the image of a loving, giving, and generous God. We believe real life, true liberty, and eternal joy are only realized when we live lives of abundant generosity and sacrificial love."

Giving to God is good news because as we practice giving, we are connected to our birthright, to a life of purpose and meaning in community! Giving to God is good news because it ushers us into a pattern of worship where we are reminded, 'For God so loved the world that God

gave . . .' Giving to God is good news because as we accept and take up our calling as stewards, entrusted by God with the weighty matters of choosing how we will manage our lives, our wealth, our energies and our relationships, we too can experience, in a measured way, the delight with which God must have reveled on that first dawn as God announced – "and indeed, it is very good!" You are



born to be generous. You are born a steward. You are the beloved of God, freed to be generous, caring and loving for the sake of the world. Thanks be to God! 'Celebrating Stewards' is a theme that will be woven into the fabric of worship and daily life ministry during the first four weeks of November at Mt. Si Lutheran. You will be invited into times of prayer. You will be invited to celebrate the stewards around you and your own calling as a steward in worship and fellowship. You will also be asked to consider how you will share God's blessings as you invest yourself in the work of ministry through Mt. Si Lutheran.

These are exciting times as we listen, learn, and celebrate again the many generous stewards in this community who already know the good news of giving to God from their wealth, through their worship, and in their serving even as we daily receive from God's love in Christ Jesus! 
